

WE MUST OBEY, LIKE ABRAHAM

For this month's readings, we will focus on the history and future of Israel. You will be led through selected Bible passages that show you Israel's triumphs and failures, as well as victories and defeats.

Israel plays a crucial part in God's plan of salvation for a lost mankind. When God called Abraham, He began to set in motion a plan to raise a group of people that will know Him, obey Him and serve Him. These people were the seed or descendants of Abraham, first called the children of Israel, the Israelites, and later, the Jews. When they conquered the land of Canaan and began to have rules and laws for governing their people and land, Israel as a nation was born.

It all began when Abraham obeyed God's call to him. Abram, as Abraham was known at the beginning, was called when he was living in a country called Ur in Mesopotamia. He was living a comfortable life when God called him to leave his country and his father's house to travel to a land that God will show him. God promised to make a great nation out of him, bless him and make his name great. God will protect him. For all those who curse him will be cursed.

Down the centuries to this day, all families are blessed if they believe in Jesus Christ, the Saviour born of the line of the father of the Jews, Abram (Abraham). Abram, full of faith, obeyed the LORD. That is how it must be with us, too. God speaks and we must obey.

Thought: May I obey God like Abram did.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, it is amazing that Abram would leave a life of certainty for a life of uncertainty, to a land he has never been to. I know this is possible only because he had great faith. So teach me, Heavenly Father, to be like Abraham, to have faith and complete trust in you. This I pray in Jesus' name, Amen

THE PROMISE TO ABRAHAM

In today's verse, we have the record of the everlasting covenant that God made with Abraham – that God will multiply his descendants. Was the promise of God easy for Abraham to believe? We will not know the answer to this question until we know how old Abraham was when this promise was given to him.

Why don't you make a guess? Was Abraham in his 30s, or perhaps 40s? No! Verse 1 of Genesis 17 tells us Abraham was 99 years old! Verse 17 of Genesis 17 further tells us that Abraham would be 100 years old and his wife Sarah 90 years old by the time the child was born. How old are your grandparents? It is unlikely they would be as old as Abraham and Sarah were then. Can you imagine your grandmother pregnant! What if you came home from school one day and mummy tells you that grandma is pregnant? You would think it is a joke!

For Abraham to believe God was no easy task. The usual child-bearing age of a woman is about 15 to late 40s. Sarah was almost twice the age of the oldest mothers around! People would be laughing if they knew of this. But Abraham believed.

Abraham's faith was so strong and so early on in human history that believers today are called children of Abraham! We will see in the passages of this month that although Abraham was a man of God and had great faith as today's reading tells us, he was not perfect. He would fail at times, needing the grace and forgiveness of the Lord. That is the case for all believers. There is no Christian out there that is perfect.

So at times, when you fail, at times, when you sin, do not be discouraged. Look to the Lord, as Abraham did, and trust in the God who will never forsake or leave us.

Thought: May I learn from Abraham!

Prayer: Heavenly Father, thank You for the great promise You have given to Abraham, and thank You that he believed. Please grant me the faith to believe the many promises You have given me in your Word. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

THE RICHNESS AND GOODNESS OF THE LAND

The Lord knows that irrigation is vital to farmers and those who live off the land. Thus, the land that the Lord promised Abraham is a “good land, a land of brooks of water, of fountains and depths that spring out of valleys and hills”. It will be well-watered and fertile, allowing farmers to grow crops abundantly. It will have no lack of rivers for fishing, washing, transportation etc. In the hills and valleys, farmers could grow a variety of crops and keep cattle and sheep, so that the people will always have plenty on the table.

Many of us may not appreciate the need for fertile land as we can easily buy fruit, plants and food off the shelves of so many stores and supermarkets in Singapore. But in those times, and in many parts of the world today, people still rely on the land they live in for livelihood.

Not only was the Promised Land of Canaan productive above ground, it was filled with goodness below the surface! From beneath the ground, the descendants of Abraham could produce iron and brass. How blessed were these people!



Thought: How good is the God we adore!

Prayer: Heavenly Father, thank You for the abundance You have promised Abraham's seed. Thank You too for what You have given us. I pray I would learn to be grateful for my parents, my family, my school, and my church. And for the fact that I am able to read Your holy Word every day. This I pray in Jesus' name, Amen.

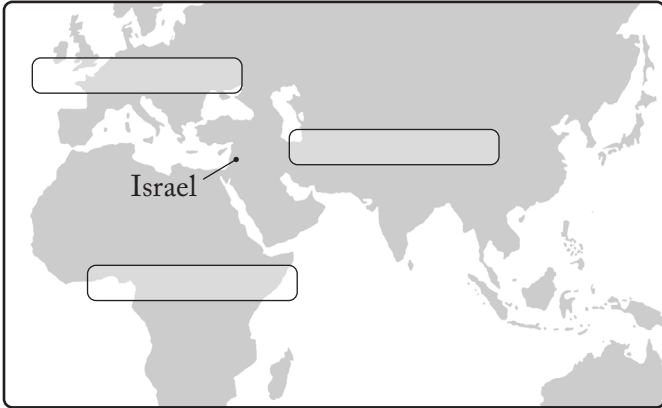
THE PRE-EMINENT LOCATION

GOD'S TIMING IS THE BEST

Abraham, with his son Isaac and grandson Jacob, dwelt in the land of Canaan as strangers because the land was not yet theirs. It was occupied and owned by various tribes sometimes collectively called the Canaanites. One reason the patriarchs had not gained possession of Canaan, their Promised Land, was that the iniquity of the Amorites was not yet full (Genesis 15:16).

God is the Judge of all the earth. It was not until 430 years after Abraham's children had sojourned in Egypt that Canaan would then be ripe for judgement and the land transferred to them (Genesis 15:16). Indeed we are reminded in another Bible verse that "To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven" (Ecclesiastes 3:1).

When God's hour of judgement came, the Lord instructed Moses with these words, "Turn you, and take your journey...to the land of the Canaanites. Behold I have set the land before you: go in and possess the land which the LORD swore unto your fathers, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, to give unto them, and to their seed after them" (Deuteronomy 1:7-8). Eventually, the Israelites successfully conquered the land of Canaan.

As children, sometimes we allow our desire for fun or food to control us. Not many children can refrain from an offer of yummy ice-cream and wonderful cookies. Or for an afternoon of fun with friends. But at times, our parents do not allow us to indulge further in fun or food. Why? Perhaps it is because we are not well, or are already too tired, and we know too much ice-cream and games can be bad for us! Mum and Dad know better than us, and they love us, and so we have to abide by their timing. Likewise, God's timing is not the same as ours, but is always the best.

Thought: To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven.

Prayer: Teach me, Heavenly Father, the importance of waiting on You for Your perfect timing. Often I am impatient but help me Lord to wait on You. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

FOLLOWING GOD ALL THE WAY

When we become a believer, we are to trust God. How much and how often should we trust and follow Him? There are many accounts of the Israelites not getting full blessings because they chose when and where to trust and follow God. Although the Promised Land is a land promised to the Israelites already, they were to follow specific instructions – God made it clear that Israel would possess the land on condition of absolute obedience. If Israel refused to obey and did not do all God’s commandments, then Israel must be prepared to be punished. They would find that their prosperity would be taken away. Their land would be barren and the number of their sheep and cattle would not increase. Their enemies would become stronger than them. They would be struck down with all sorts of diseases.

In today’s scripture text, you will read that the Israelites would be cursed – a very strong word indeed. Who would like to be cursed? Clearly none of us; clearly none of the Israelites. However, the way by which many of them lived their lives demonstrated they did not heed God’s warnings. And eventually, as we will discover in this month of reading, there will really be hardship and pain for the Israelites.

You might have heard the story of Fanny Crosby. She was an American lyricist known for penning many beautiful hymns. She became blind shortly after birth and was a faithful Christian. One of her most famous, was “All the Way My Saviour Leads Me”.

*All the way my Saviour leads me; What have I to ask beside?
Can I doubt His tender mercy,
Who through life has been my Guide?
Heav’nly peace, divinest comfort, Here by faith in Him to dwell!
For I know, what’e’r befall me, Jesus doeth all things well;
For I know, what’e’r befall me, Jesus doeth all things well.*

Thought: All the way my Saviour leads me, what have I to ask beside?

Prayer: Heavenly Father, I am so glad I have You always to lead me. Help me to learn how to follow You all the way. In Jesus’ name I pray, Amen.

A STIFF NECK

Have you ever suffered from a stiff neck? Probably not, since you are still young. But go ask your parents – they might have experienced it. Like back pain and headaches, the problem of stiff neck belongs to the list of more common complaints adults have. This illness occurs when a person suddenly experiences terrible pain when he or she moves his or her head.

Let me tell you a secret – many Israelites had stiff necks. Their problem was not a physical stiff neck; theirs was a spiritual stiff neck. Now what does that mean? It means they were stubborn and refused to obey the Lord. Their necks were “stiff” as they refused to turn towards the Lord. Their necks were “stiff” as they did not want to turn away from their own sin and set ideas.

Moses warned the people – that if they continued to have stiff necks when he was alive, they would have even more serious problems when he was not around to guide them! In a way, does that not apply to us? We have Sunday School teachers or parents to guide and warn us, but when they are physically not with us, do we forget their teachings and refuse to obey God?

There is a popular song called “Trust and Obey”. As you read the words, pray that the Lord will touch and convict you that there is no better way but to trust and obey Him.

When we walk with the Lord in the light of His Word,

What a glory He sheds on our way!

While we do His good will, He abides with us still,

And with all who will trust and obey.

Trust and obey, for there's no other way

To be happy in Jesus, but to trust and obey.

Thought: May I not have a stiff neck!

Prayer: Heavenly Father, teach me to obey You in all things so that I will find happiness and peace in Your will. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

ARE YOU A COMPLAINER?

The Israelites were held as slaves in Egypt for many years. What is slavery? Slavery is a form of forced labour in which people are considered to be, or treated as, the property of others. Slaves can be held against their will from the time of their capture, purchase or birth, and deprived of the right to leave, to refuse to work, or to receive compensation for their work. Whilst there are different forms of slavery, what is clear is that slavery was very cruel and destroys lives. For a slave who has the chance of freedom, he would probably fight for it, and may even be willing to die for it. For a slave to be granted freedom, you can imagine the great gratitude he must have for the one who liberated him!

Now consider the Israelites who had been slaves to the Egyptians for years, and by God's deliverance, were freed from their Egyptian masters. They had seen the hand of God in bringing about their escape and exodus (name of the second book in the Bible, and this word means a movement of a very large group of people), been given a new lease of life, but were now complaining! What is the meaning of the word "complainer"? A complainer is someone who laments and finds fault with things, and is not happy with what he or she has. Such a person is usually not contented with his or her lot in life. It is amazing the Israelites forgot how terrible it was when they were slaves in Egypt and actually yearned for the food they had there. It seems they were almost willing to sell their freedom for food!

God has done so much for us as He has for the Israelites. Are we grateful, or are we like the Israelites who were complainers?

God has done so much for you. List two blessings the Lord has given you, and thank Him for them!

Thought: May I never be a complainer!

Prayer: Heavenly Father, help me to be grateful for Your kindness and never to be a complainer! In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

ARE YOU SET FOR FAILURE?

The Israelites were now at the border of the Promised Land. Instead of bubbling with excitement at the prospect of entering and possessing the land God promised, they were afraid. Instead of looking to God for help, they looked to their weaknesses and failed to see how God can work through them despite their weaknesses. In other words, they set themselves up for failure. Their motto became “We be not able” (Numbers 13:31), and no amount of pleading and reasoning could help them. Why was this so? It was because they did not look to God. They could see nothing but failure and obstacles in front of them. They believed the enemies were much stronger and bigger than they (verse 31), that the land was one that would “devour people” (verse 32), – that it made life very difficult for them, and they were so afraid they referred to themselves as “grasshoppers” (verse 33).

God’s assurance of divine help was buried beneath a pile of exaggerated fears and doubts. All they could see was the word FAILURE. For these Israelites, failure was not merely a possibility; it was a foregone conclusion. Because of that, they grieved like people who have been defeated, even before they fought the enemies! Were they defeated? Physically, no. But in reality, they were because in their minds they had already lost. They were set for failure. Are we sometimes like that? When problems come our way, do we use a magnifying glass to examine them and fear them such that our faith melts and the word FAILURE stares straight at our face?

Dear child, whatever problems you or your family might face, remember you are NOT set for failure. The Lord has promised that He would guide and guard you, and He will keep His promise!

Thought: Look not at my weaknesses with despair but look to the Lord for help.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, teach me to trust You in all things. I know trouble and problems will come my way, or my family’s way, but Heavenly Father, help me to commit them into Your hands for You care for me. In Jesus’ name I pray, Amen.

TRIPLE M

For the first part of this month, we have been looking at the selected history of the Israelites. One simple way to remember is to look at three Ms – Misery, Mercy, Mission.

Misery refers to more than 400 years of Israel's time in Egypt after the Egyptians had forgotten who Joseph was and how he helped the Egyptians tide over the seven years of famine, and how he helped Pharaoh rule well. The people of Israel were enslaved and treated badly until the Lord sent Moses to free them. The next M refers to **Mercy** – the Lord granted mercy during their 40 years in the wilderness despite their complaining and grumbling. The Lord eventually led them to the border of the Promised Land. The last M stands for **Mission**. Their mission was clear – to occupy the Promised Land and drive out the enemies who were there.

Who did they have to guide them? Moses was now dead and the new man in charge was Joshua. And God knows it was a very difficult task, thus God gave to Joshua a very important command – “Be strong and of a good courage”. Because Joshua was a General, we can expect him to be a brave and athletic man. But is this the kind of strength and courage the Lord is talking about? No. God is talking about spiritual strength. He is more concerned with our ability to withstand the world and its influences.

Your friends in class and school may think it is silly of you to go to church, to believe the “stories” in the Bible, to believe there is no evolution and; that the Lord made the entire universe in six days. What would you say to that? Would you be able to withstand their laughter and scorn? Or would you be like Joshua – a strong and courageous child of the Lord?

Thought: May I be a strong and brave child for the witness of the Lord!

Prayer: Heavenly Father, teach me to lean on You for strength and courage. On my own, I am weak and sometimes fearful. So Heavenly Father, grant me the strength I need, and the courage necessary to always follow Jesus. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

DOING THE IMPOSSIBLE!

Do you know how many rivers there are in Singapore? Most of us will think there are only a handful. In reality, there are almost 90 rivers, but most of them are very small and unknown to most people. The largest is the Singapore River, but compared to major rivers of the world, the Singapore River is still very small. Do you think it is easy to swim across this river? Some of you who are better swimmers might not find it a problem but others will. For the Israelites, to fight for the Promised Land, they have to first cross the River Jordan. This is the first and one of the most difficult tasks for them. Remember they have been wandering in the desert for 40 years and there were no swimming lessons to be had there! So most, if not all, of them of fighting age were non-swimmers. How then could they overcome such a great obstacle?

Crossing River Jordan on their own would have been impossible if they relied on their own strength, and God knew that. Sometimes, there are things beyond our control. There are sometimes difficulties that are way too tough for you to handle. What should you do then? Pray. And remember yesterday's lesson – Be strong and of a good courage. If God knows there is something beyond your ability, He will enable you to accomplish it. Crossing the river at that time was also very dangerous for it was swelling and raging at that time of the year. If we were there, we would be able to not just see the rushing river, but hear the roar of the waters and experience the splashing of the waves upon the banks. It must have been a frightening sight.

But what happened after that? Look at the scripture text for today. As soon as the priests' soles touched the waters, the river stopped flowing! How wonderful that was! It must have taken a lot of courage for the priests to step into the waters, especially as they were carrying the Ark! What if they fell, or sank? It was brilliant that the Lord stopped the waters such that no harm could come to His people.

Dear child, if there is some obstacle you think is too difficult for you, commit it to the Lord. What is impossible for you might turn out to be an opportunity for you to see how God can work in your life.

Thought: For with God nothing shall be impossible.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, thank You so much that I have a God with whom nothing is impossible! Teach me, Heavenly Father, to cast all my burdens upon You. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

HUMILITY IS THE BEST POLICY

In Joshua 1, God told Joshua to be strong and of good courage when he assumed leadership of the Israelites. Joshua was faithful to the end and as we come to the close of this book, we read in today's scripture text that Joshua was now an old man. He had been successful in occupying the major cities in the Promised Land. Although there were still pockets of resistance, the major battles have been fought and won.

He called for the leaders and elders and gave them a farewell message. In this message, did he talk about his achievements and how great a leader he had been? Was he boasting of how wonderful a General and leader he was to the people? Not at all. Joshua made no mention of himself, but pointed them to the Lord, and how God was the power behind their conquest of the Promised Land. In such a great leader, we see profound humility. That is surely something we can learn today!

If we were to ask your friends and your parents whether you are a humble child, what do you think the answer would be? Dear child, humility is one of the most important though least sought-after trait a Christian should have.

Perhaps one reason for Joshua's humility was that he remembered the meaning of his name – "Jehovah is salvation". He remembered that it was God who saved and enabled, and thus, he should not have any desire to aim for self glory of any sort.

While Joshua is a wonderful example of humility, the best example is Jesus. He, as King of kings, came to suffer humiliation, betrayal, and a terrible death on the cross. Philippians 2:5-8 sum it up well:

Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus: Who, being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God: But made Himself of no reputation, and took upon Him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men: And being found in fashion as a man, He humbled Himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross.

Thought: May I be a humble child.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, please help me learn to be a humble child and to remember that all that I have and am comes from You. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

FAITHFUL ALL THE WAY

What are some of the fastest times taken for a man to run 100 meters? These world-class sprinters take less than 10 seconds to complete the 100 meter run and it is amazing how fast these athletes are!

Is our Christian life like that of a 100-meter sprint? I am afraid not. Instead, the Christian life is more likened to a marathon. It is a long endurance test. There are ups and downs in our Christian life, much like a physical marathon. Even the best marathoners take more than two hours.

Coming to our scripture text today, we see the consistency and faithfulness of Joshua. Near the end of his life, he still asked the people to look to the Lord, to be courageous as the Lord had commanded him when they were about to enter the Promised Land. This is another important lesson for us – to be faithful to the end. Many can be faithful when the battle begins, but how many will last?

Dear child, you are still young and many are the years ahead of you. Commit your ways to the Lord and remain faithful, for great are the rewards and wonders of a life surrendered to the Lord. Begin in small ways: Be faithful in doing your Quiet Time, be faithful in being kind and helpful, be faithful in obeying and honouring your parents, and be faithful in the giving of your best in school work.



Thought: May I be a faithful and consistent child.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, may I learn to be faithful and consistent for You. Help me to understand that my Christian life is not so much a short sprint, but a long run that can be filled with twists and tumbles, and I need to remain close to Jesus all the way. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

ONE SIN LEADS TO ANOTHER

After Joshua died, problems started to appear. You will read in verses 28 to 30 that the tribes were disobedient as they did not drive out the Canaanites. Instead, they made the Canaanites their tributaries – it means these people were allowed to live but had to pay taxes or give regular food or other supplies to the Israelites, who were more powerful than them.

Against God's revealed Word, the Israelites preferred material goods and earthly comfort to obeying the Lord. Why would they do it? It benefited them in having the Canaanites work for free, or have the Canaanites pay them sums of money or supply food regularly. However, if what benefits us is against the command of the Lord, we should never be lured into it.

Worse, one sin leads to a greater one. Instead of driving the Canaanites out, they were allowed to live with the Israelites. Then the problem got worse – the Israelites began to leave their own and live among the Canaanites! We are all affected by people and circumstances around us. If we have friends who use vulgar words, defy authority, refuse to study hard, spend hours everyday on computer games, we are likely to behave like them. If we surround ourselves with children who are boastful of their academic excellence, or even of their spiritual standing, we are likely to be influenced by them.

What we see in them we may want to follow because we may be lured to believe it is not so bad after all. Furthermore, our fleshly nature makes us want to do more than they might have done. This was the problem of the Israelites for the sins of one tribe led to the larger sins of another tribe.

Thought: May I view sin seriously, and stay far from it.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, You know I am weak and can easily be led into sin. So Heavenly Father, help me to stand firm and to keep close to the Word that I might draw strength from You. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

WHAT IS A SGC?

The period of the Judges is a sad one for Israel – it would be about 350 years of degeneration before the Monarchy (that is, when Israel is ruled by kings) took place. Israel now had a new generation – a generation after Joshua and the leaders who fought alongside Joshua. The main problem was that these people strayed.

In a way, this group of people is similar to the “second-generation Christians” (SGC) we see in church. Are you a SGC? If you are, chances are you came to church when you were very young; you did not ask to be in church; you might sometimes not like coming to church; you might have heard of many Bible stories; and perhaps sometimes, you think you know a lot already.

If you are in this category, be careful. Be careful of the sin of knowing about the Bible but not knowing the Jesus of the Bible.

Not all SGCs are saved. They might be church-going and Bible-carrying, but what is much more important is that they must know Jesus as their personal Lord and Saviour.

Are there times when you would rather not go to church but your parents drag you there anyway? Or perhaps you do not see your parents living the Christian life that you or your Junior Worship teachers teach you and thus, you might be discouraged?

Remember that your parents are not perfect; they have weaknesses and failings because they are also human. Pray for them. Look to the Lamb of God, our precious Lord Jesus, who is the perfect example for all of us.

The repentance of the SGC in the times of Judges was NOT real, for they went back to their old ways of sin even after showing outward remorse or sadness. Let us not be like them.

Thought: Is my repentance real and sincere?

Prayer: Heavenly Father, help me to be really sorry for the sin I have committed and teach me to have genuine repentance, especially if I am a SGC. Please help me to examine my life and to ensure that I am Your child. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

DO NOT JUDGE BASED ON HOW PEOPLE LOOK

Because King Saul had disobeyed the Lord, the Lord rejected him. The Lord then sent the prophet Samuel to anoint a new King in Saul's place. Samuel was sent to the house of Jesse at Bethlehem to anoint one of Jesse's sons to be the next King. When Jesse and his sons stood before the prophet Samuel, the prophet looked upon one of Jesse's sons called Eliab and said "Surely the LORD's anointed is before him." Perhaps, the prophet was impressed with Eliab's tall stature and Eliab was good-looking. Samuel thought that Eliab was fit to be the next king. But the Lord said to Samuel, "Look not on his countenance, or on the height of his stature, because I have refused him: for the LORD seeth not as man seeth; for man looketh on the outward appearance but the LORD looketh on the heart." Later on, the Lord instructed Samuel to anoint David whom the Lord had chosen to be the next King, in place of Saul. David turned out to be a man after God's own heart. David was obedient and faithful to the Lord. Although at times David fell into sin, he always repented and sought the Lord's forgiveness.

While there is nothing wrong with being good-looking, or tall, or beautiful, we cannot judge people based on their external looks. But do we?

What would your reaction be if a visitor who looks very different, joins the Junior Worship? Perhaps he could be from a different culture. Would you be kind to him and say "Hello!" because he is new, and try to make him feel at ease? Or would you shun him, or worse, tell others how funny he looks?

Do you think the Lord Jesus, as a child, would laugh cruelly at new kids who look different? God will only judge a person's heart and not the person's outward appearance. What is more important to God is whether the person has a heart that obeys God and is faithful to Him. Let us all learn not to judge a person based on his or her external appearance.

Thought: May I not judge others based on their looks.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, sometimes I fall into the sin of judging others by their appearance. Help me not to do that again, but to be a kind and humble child myself. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

ARE YOU A TRUE FRIEND?

All of us have friends. Some are kind and generous. We love to be with friends as we play with them, have fun together, and as Christians, hope to learn and grow in the faith together. That is why it is important that you mix with the right type of friends, because they will influence you to a large extent.

Have you ever imagined how others view you as a friend? Do they think you are a nice boy or girl, whether you are selfish, or whether you behave well only when adults (in particular your parents) are around? How can we learn to be a true friend?

Jonathan was a true friend. The meaning of the name “Jonathan” is “Gift of God”. Indeed, the biblical Jonathan was a gift of God. Although he was the son of King Saul, and that Saul wanted him to take over the throne, Jonathan did not want it because he knew it was God’s will for David to be king.

This is a rare friend, for he could easily have the most powerful position in the land, and yet willingly made way for his friend David. In Jonathan, we see the beauty of sacrifice, of humility, of selflessness, but most of all, of someone who seeks and follows God’s will.

Are you like Jonathan? When you play with friends, do you always seek to win? If you are playing shooting games, do you prefer to have the most powerful gun? If you are playing “dressing up the dolls”, do you want the most glamorous dress for your doll? When you sit down for food and drinks, are you gracious and allow others to begin before you help yourself to the food and drinks? Above these, do you care for others?

Think about some areas you can improve as a friend to others, and commit them to the Lord:

BRAVE KING – BUT NOT PERFECT

Imagine you read in the newspapers that there is a murder case – X plotted to kill Y. X is a very powerful man and through his connections, got Y killed. It was the perfect murder, because Y, a soldier, was killed in his line of duty and it was legitimate for X to have commanded Y to fight. But the plot thickens – before X sent Y to die in battle, X had coveted Y's wife, and that is the main motive for the murder.

How would you feel about X? Would you think X is a good man? What would your reaction be should your father invite X for dinner at home? Who is this X we are talking about?

It is King David, Israel's brave warrior-king who was a courageous General who led God's people into many victories. Why then did David do what he did? Like all of us, David is a sinful man.

We read the word "sinful" so often we may not fully understand. "Sinful" means "full of sin". David was, like all of us, full of sin. But David was also different. He was a man who when corrected, would not argue or give excuses. He was a man who dared to repent and to return to God. That is why he penned the words in the scripture text for today – for he wrote this Psalm after his sin was pointed out to him.

How about you? If someone points out your mistake, what is your first reaction? Would you be angry and blame someone else? Would you deny it was you who made that mistake? Or would you learn from King David to accept your mistake, learn from it, and try not to do it again?

Thought: May I learn from my mistakes and not shy away from them.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, I know I sin but what is more important is that I learn from my mistakes and not repeat my sins. So Heavenly Father, give me a heart that will learn and not push away responsibilities from my mistakes. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

WISEST KING – BUT NOT PERFECT

In the history of Israel, Saul was the first king, followed by David, and then Solomon. After Solomon died, Israel split into the Northern and Southern kingdoms. We shall continue learning about Israel's history of the divided kingdom.

The Northern Kingdom consisted of 10 tribes and the Southern Kingdom had 2 tribes. Both kingdoms were later invaded by external armies. The Israelites were then exiled before they re-gathered. We will then talk about the founding of the modern state of Israel as it is today and see how God's almighty hand was on this nation all along. But for today, we will look at Solomon, the last king of the united kingdom. He was often called the wisest king. Solomon was much blessed. As we can read from today's scripture text, God gave him not only wisdom, but also riches, wealth and honour such as no king before or after him had! Wow, what a great promise that is!

Solomon was so smart and his memory so good that he was like a walking library. If someone needed information on biology, or other sciences, he could help; if someone gave brain-teasers, Solomon could answer all of them. Yet, although he was a great king endowed with immense abilities and wealth, he was not perfect.

To have peace and good relations with nations around Israel, Solomon did something he was not supposed to do – he married non-Jewish wives. And yes, he had many wives and concubines. Guess how many he had? 1 Kings 11:3 says he had 700 wives and 300 concubines! How many wives should he have? Only one, of course! Despite the intellect he had, he sinned by having so many wives. Worse, his wives led him astray and introduced many false religions into Israel.

No one is perfect; everyone needs the Lord. If even the wisest king can go astray, how much more will you and I?

Thought: May I trust not in my abilities but only in the Lord Jesus.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, sometimes I do not place my full reliance on You and I know that is not the right thing to do. Help me, Heavenly Father, to always turn to You for help. If even the wisest king on earth can fail, surely I can too. So please teach me, Heavenly Father. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

THE NORTHERN KINGDOM DISPERSED

The Northern Kingdom departed from the one true and living God when their king Jeroboam introduced worship of the golden calf. Then it got worse – under King Ahab, God’s people worshipped Baal. In fact, the Northern Kingdom was ruled by kings that were wicked from beginning to end.

God had to judge His wayward people. They served idols that they placed everywhere. They rejected God and His commandments. They even sacrificed their sons and daughters in ceremonial fires! God raised the Assyrian kings to invade Israel time and again until she was taken into captivity in 722 BC. The warning by Moses of foreign invasion and Israel’s dispersal first took effect in the Northern Kingdom.

Although Israel sinned, did God give up on them? No, but they had to be punished. Likewise for us, if we are truly saved and yet sin against the Lord, God will punish us because He disciplines those He loves. But the Lord will never give up on us.

Even after we become Christians, all of us are affected by sin. It is how we fight sin that is important. How do we fight sin? Firstly, we must read the Bible everyday for this will help change our thinking and life. We might be proud. Or you might be a critical kid, always commenting unkindly about things and people. If you are touched with God’s word, you will know that is not right in His eyes.

Secondly, we must pray consistently. Pray not just before meals, or before bedtime. Commit your day to the Lord; commit your homework to the Lord; commit your playtime to the Lord.

Thirdly, have good Christian fellowship. Mix with children who are able to have a positive influence in your life. You see, we all influence each other and should you hang around children who are bossy, you might learn to be like them. If you are always with children who play a lot of harmful computer games, chances are, you will learn to be like them.

Thought: May I learn to fight sin!

Prayer: Heavenly Father, may I always learn to do the three things mentioned above – read Your holy Word every day, pray consistently, and be with friends who bring glory to You. In Jesus’ name I pray, Amen.

THE SOUTHERN KINGDOM DISPERSED

The Southern Kingdom continued for a longer period. God wanted her to learn from what happened to the Northern Kingdom. Sadly, the people did not learn from the mistakes of others, and so had to eventually learn from their own mistakes.

Although good kings such as Hezekiah and Josiah led in removing idols and teaching the people the commandments of the Lord, the people very soon returned to idolatry and immorality.

God sent many prophets to warn Judah what would happen if they continued to reject God. It was to no avail – the people did not listen. Judah was doomed to destruction. In 586 BC, Nebuchadnezzar, the Babylonian king, destroyed Jerusalem and burnt down the Temple, set fire on the king's house and exiled the third and final batch of Jews to Babylon.

Some say that mistakes are stepping stones to success. Is that true? Do we have to make mistakes to ensure we have success? There are many things we can learn from the mistakes of others, and one main lesson is – do not make the same mistakes! The people of the Southern Kingdom saw what happened to the Northern Kingdom, yet fell into the same trap of sin against God.

Perhaps they were not teachable. Are we teachable? Are we able to learn lessons from the Lord, or do we have to bear the pain of the consequences of our mistakes in order to learn?

Thought: Be teachable and learn from the mistakes of others.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, may I have a tender and humble heart to be teachable when I have done wrong. Sometimes that is difficult but may I learn to always turn to You for help. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

PURPOSED IN YOUR HEART = ?

Many of us are familiar with the account of Daniel. It is mentioned in today's scripture text that Daniel purposed in his heart he would not defile himself with the food given to him. What does the phrase "purposed in his heart" mean?

That phrase means Daniel had the intention and determination not to defile himself. Was eating what must be yummy food from the palace of the king sinful? It must have been so, because Daniel rejected it. Although we are not told what food it was, it was likely things that God forbade the Jews to eat, and perhaps it was food already offered to the Babylonian gods.

Now think about it – Daniel was a slave whose life was in the hands of his masters. We do not know how old Daniel was when he took that step of faith, but he was likely a teenager then. You see, the Babylonians would take young teens and inculcate them with the customs of their nation, and give them Babylonian names and identities. People around Daniel must have thought how good it was to be chosen to eat such wonderful food, yet this slave boy refused to eat it! How dare he disobey the kind gestures of his masters!

What are the possible outcomes of his stand? Daniel could have easily been killed; there were many other Jewish male slaves the Babylonians could have as a replacement. Even if Daniel was not killed for his stand, he could have been jailed or punished in another way. However, none of these happened. Instead, his request was amazingly granted!

God honoured what Daniel purposed in his heart, which was to please God by not eating of the king's food.

What have you purposed in your heart? Some of you may think, "I am too young to purpose anything in my heart." You are not too young to purpose in your heart to honour God in your life. Daniel would have been a few years older than a Primary Six child, yet he had the faith many men do not possess!

Thought: May I purpose in my heart to honour God always.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, thank You for the example of Daniel. May I learn to be more like him, that I will stand up for Jesus, that I will stand up for the truth. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

GOD HATES SIN

The Bible in Psalm 5:4-5 tells us that God hates sin. Sin has two aspects. First, the inability to meet up with God's standard of holiness. Second, it also includes the breaking of God's commandments. God is Holy and He will not let sin go unpunished.

God views sin seriously. The first part of Romans 6:23 tells us "For the wages of sin is death." Every person will die eventually. If a person dies in his sin without accepting the Lord Jesus, he will end up in hell and the Lake of fire. Man is unable to save himself from sin. But thank God that the second part of Romans 6:23 says, "but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." God has provided the way for men to be saved and to have eternal life. Because man is unable to save himself, God the Father had to send the Lord Jesus Christ, His own beloved Son, to save us from our sins. The Lord Jesus Christ is 100% God and 100% man. He is perfectly sinless. While on this earth He lived a perfectly sinless life and obeyed God's commandments perfectly. The Lord Jesus then died on the Cross for our sins. He was the perfect sacrifice and was a substitute for our sins. After He died on the Cross, on the third day He rose again. God the Father accepted His sacrifice for us. The Lord Jesus now sits at the right hand of God the Father.

Sin is so serious that God the Father had to send His Son to die for our sins. Why did God the Father send His Son to save sinners? John 3:16 tells us, "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." It was because of God's love for us that He sent His Son to die for our sins.

Dear child, have you accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as your Lord and Saviour? God loves you and is waiting for you. All you have to do is to confess that you are a sinner and that you need God's grace. You need to believe that the Lord Jesus Christ died for your sins and that He rose on the third day. Will you pray to God and accept the Lord Jesus Christ as your Lord and Saviour today?

Thought: Am I thankful to God for sending His Son to die for my sins?

Prayer: Heavenly Father, may I realise the seriousness of sin and thank God for sending the Lord Jesus to die for my sins. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

APPLE OF HIS EYE

Today's Bible verse tells us the Jews were the apple of God's eye – that the Lord protected and watched over them in the wilderness. What does it mean when the phrase “apple of one's eye” is used?

The word “apple” is translated from the Hebrew language and that word can mean black. This phrase “apple of one's eye” thus means the pupil of one's eye – that portion of your eye that is so sensitive and so important to sight. Would you ever let someone touch your pupil? Of course not, unless of course it is an eye doctor who needs to examine you, but you will also tend to flinch.

Why do we not allow others to touch our eye's pupil? First of all, it is instinctive. When someone moves his hand quickly towards your eye, you will instinctively blink or close your eyes to protect your pupil. Secondly, we do not allow others to touch our pupils because they are so sensitive. If our pupils are affected, our eyesight may be harmed. Lastly, our pupils can easily be injured. These three reasons help us better understand the meaning of the phrase “apple of one's eye”.

Is it not wonderful that the Jews are the apple of God's eye? That is why even after the Northern and Southern Kingdoms were destroyed, the Jews remained the apple of God's eye and eventually, God restored the nation of Israel.

The same applies to us – we too are the apple of God's eye because Jesus washed away our sins when He died in our place for our own sins. Since we are so precious to God, He will protect us. Is that not wonderful? We know we are the apples of our parents' eyes, and that they will provide and protect us. The same applies with our Heavenly Father!

Thought: So grateful to be so loved by God!

Prayer: Heavenly Father, thank You so much that I am the apple of Your eye. May I always remember how precious this privilege is, and how I must treasure it by being true and close to God. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

WHO IS JESUS TO YOU?

Do you recall yesterday's lesson – that we are the apple of God's eye? Because God loves us so much, He sent His only begotten Son to be born a helpless baby. This is the grandest of all events in history, as recorded for us by the Apostle Paul, "But when the fullness of the time was come, God sent forth His Son, made of a woman, made under the law," (Galatians 4:4).

But even before Jesus was born, the king at that time who knew that Christ was to be born, wanted to kill Jesus. To the king, Jesus was a potential competitor to the throne. He hated that idea and ordered that all Jewish baby boys be killed so that there would be no chance of Jesus escaping. Of course, in God's marvellous timing and providence, Jesus was protected.

Christ came as prophesied, to save His people from their sins. But when Jesus began to preach the gospel to His own people, He was not only rejected but chased out from his community! To the Jews, Jesus was a weakling who could not help them fight the Romans.

Most people in the world do not believe in Jesus as the Saviour and Lord of the world. Many believe Jesus as a good man, as someone they can admire, or as someone whose moral sayings they can agree with.

What about you? Who is Jesus to you?

THE SAVIOUR WAS REJECTED

Not only did the Jews reject “the true Light, which lighteth every man that cometh into the world”, but they also killed the Son of God by demanding that He be crucified. They even went so far as to bring a curse on themselves!

And so it came to pass that in the next generation, the curse fell upon the diehard Jews. In 70 AD the Roman General, Titus, set the holy city Jerusalem on fire. Countless perished in the flames and by the sword! A large number of Jews were also sold into slavery or exiled to other countries.

As persecutions occurred during the reigns of different Roman emperors, the scattering of all Jews became complete. This is now known as the Diaspora. What happened to the land of Israel, the Promised Land that God had given to the Jews? The people had been judged and scattered to the four corners of the earth. Jerusalem was subjected to conquests by foreign powers. After the fall of the Roman Empire, it was ruled by the Arabs Crusaders, Ottoman Turks, and finally the British from 1918-1948.

It appears that wherever the Jews went they had a hard time. The curse they had brought down upon themselves and their children burst forth with hellish fury when Hitler, during World War 2, put six million Jews to death! They were tortured in concentration camps and/or gassed. It is scary to know that over a million of those who died were innocent children.

However, the physical terror the Jews suffered would pale in comparison to the sufferings in hell. For those who reject the loving grace of God through Jesus, an eternity of suffering awaits them. That is the most serious punishment anyone can ever have.

Are you saved? And if you are, do you not have loved ones or friends who are not saved? Pray for them. Ask the Lord to open the eyes of these loved ones so that perhaps, they can see the love of the Saviour, and not reject Jesus as the Jews did.

Thought: May my loved ones and I not reject Jesus!

Prayer: Heavenly Father, help me to pray for those I know who are still outside of Your kingdom – my classmates, my family members, or other friends and relatives. I pray that in my small ways, I may show them a little of Jesus so that they can turn to the Saviour. In Jesus’ name I pray, Amen.

WHAT IS THE HOLOCAUST?

The Holocaust is one of the saddest and most wicked periods of human history – that was when six million Jews were killed and persecuted by Germany during World War 2. There were 39 concentration camps in total where the Jews were to die. The worst time was between December 1941 and the end of 1944 – during this period, more than four million people were killed. The total of six million Jews killed represented about two-thirds of the entire Jewish population in Europe then.

Why would men do such evil to the Jews? The answer to this question is SIN. Sin had so possessed the minds and hearts of the Germans when they were mesmerised by a man called Hitler. He and his trusted inner circle planned the mass-murder of the Jews. Initially, many of them did not know they were sent to be killed. They were told they were to be housed in these camps, and then they were asked to go for a “shower”. In fact, what came out of the shower taps above them was not water but poisonous gases.

Should the Jews today take revenge? Of course not. Two wrongs do not make one right. The Germans have sinned grievously, and to their credit, they have confessed their wrongdoing. Today in Germany, they have memorial halls that showcase the horrors of the past and how their people have been such a cruel and mindless war machine. Some war criminals have also been tried in court. Those found guilty were jailed or executed.

Has someone wronged or hurt you? Is there something anyone has done to you that you find difficult to forgive? Or perhaps it is someone you are very close to, such as your parent or sibling.

Learn the lesson of forgiveness. Christ is willing to forgive us of our sins when we confess them to Him. Forgiveness also heals the forgiver. So the next time you think someone has done something wrong to you and you get very angry, be willing to forgive, my young friend.

Thought: Do I have a forgiving attitude?

Prayer: Heavenly Father, teach me the lesson of forgiveness. If the Jews today should not take revenge for the Holocaust, so I must learn the lesson of how to forgive. Remind me that forgiveness is in line with the nature of my Heavenly Father, who has forgiven me for the sins I have done. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

THE SMARTEST PEOPLE IN THE WORLD?

What do people such as the scientist Albert Einstein, the musician Isaac Stern, the inventor of the famous jeans brand Levi Strauss, the movie-producer and director Steven Spielberg have in common? They are all Jews.

There are about 14 million Jews in the world, a very small percentage of the world's population. However, the number of Jews that have achieved prominence is very high.

For example, a very high percentage of Nobel Prize winners for the sciences are Jewish. Nobel Prizes for the sciences are given only to those at the top of their field, whether it is Chemistry (20% of the world total), or Physics (26% of the world total), or Economics (42% of the world total).

The Jews are a special people, for they were chosen by God. Are they the smartest people in the world? Well, many think so and from what we see, it does appear to be.

But if the smartest people in the world are without God, that would be dangerous. You might have heard of an American man called Bernard Madoff who was of Jewish descent, Madoff has been convicted of the single largest fraud the world has ever seen. Over many years, he cheated thousands of investors of billions of dollars. On 29th June 2009, he was given the maximum sentence allowed – 150 years!

The smartest may not be the wisest. The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom. The Jews too need salvation through the Lord Jesus Christ. The Bible tells us that 144,000 Jews from the twelve tribes of Israel will be saved in the future (Revelation 7:4). The smartest people might not have spiritual discernment. Are you wise in spiritual matters? Do you know that God wishes for you to be a wise child, and that you would pray and rely on Him every day? If you have not done so, begin today.

Thought: May I be a wise child!

Prayer: Heavenly Father, I thank You I can have the wisdom from You when I read Your Holy Word, and practise it! So Heavenly Father, help me to persevere in my daily Quiet Time with You. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

ISRAEL'S RESTORATION

From the four corners of the earth, the Jews have returned to their homeland. In 1914, at the outbreak of World War 1, the Jewish community numbered 90,000. By 1921, there were 180,000. When Israel achieved Independence in May 1948, there were 650,000!

After Independence, immigration became a flood. The first ones to come were 25,000 survivors of the Nazi Holocaust. By 1985, Israel's population hit the four million mark as 300,000 Russian Jews arrived in Israel. Hundreds of thousands of Ethiopian Jews also arrived from Africa. Jews from all parts of the world were attracted to return, despite the difficulties and dangers. Today the population of Israel stands at more than seven million.

It is amazing that Israel even exists. As a small country situated among nations that are not friendly towards her, many believed that Israel will not survive. But what God prophesises, He brings it to pass.

Since her independence, Israel has had more than her fair share of wars. The armies of the surrounding nations attacked her when she was a new country. Time and again, the Israel Defence Forces, although poorly armed and vastly outnumbered, managed to repulse the enemies. After a temporary ceasefire, the Sinai War started in 1956 and Israel was able to defeat Egypt. In 1967, another war erupted when Egypt and other states moved their armies towards the Israeli border in Sinai. Fighting for their nation, the Israelis were able to destroy enemy forces.

Today, the nation of Israel is a powerful country but she is not blessed because of her own strength. She may not recognise it, but she is what she is only because of the promises of God.

Thought: The birth of modern Israel is a miracle that only God has brought to pass.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, give us receptive eyes and tender hearts to see Your hand at work around us. I pray that I will put my trust in the God who can move the world, so that I will not be afraid of anything, or what anyone can do to me or my family. Please accept and honour this simple faith of mine. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

THE LAST DAYS

We are living in a sobering moment in history. We are people who would probably see the last days – the days before Jesus comes and meets believers halfway in the air – it is known as “The Rapture”. But before that takes place, what will happen? What are the signs of the last days?

The scripture text gives us clues. The Bible foretells of wars, pestilences and earthquakes. Indeed, after World War 2, there have been many smaller wars. Thank God none of them had been near Singapore, but these wars are very real and have made many homeless, and have killed thousands where they occurred. Iraq and Afghanistan and Eastern Europe are just some of the places where war has hit.

As for pestilences, we are still affected by H1N1, one of the fastest spreading viruses in modern times. Again, thank God H1N1 is not as deadly as SARS. Otherwise, thousands more people would have died.

Earthquakes are becoming more devastating, and more of them are occurring as the days go by. The largest in recent memory erupted on 26th Dec 2004. The earthquake triggered a series of deadly tsunamis along the coasts in the Indian Ocean, killing nearly 230,000 people in 11 countries, and flooding coastal communities with waves up to 20 metres tall (as high as a 15-storey building)! With a magnitude of between 9.1 and 9.3, it is the second largest earthquake ever recorded. And there was the Japanese earthquake and tsunami in March 2011 which killed about 16,000 people.

For Christians, we thank God we will be raptured before even worse things happen. To be raptured means to be caught up to meet Jesus in mid-air, and He will usher us into heaven! This is not a science-fiction story but it is what the Lord has planned for those who love Him.

Do you love Him? Are you prepared for the Rapture?

Thought: Am I prepared for the Rapture?

Prayer: Heavenly Father, thank You for the reminder of the Rapture. Help me to be a good Christian child, and to live by what Your Holy Word teaches. In that way, I shall be fully prepared to meet Jesus in mid-air when He comes to take me home during the Rapture. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

EXAMINE YOURSELF...

We have spent this month looking at the history and account of the Israelite nation. Much can be learned from her mistakes, trials and failures. We see that despite the blessings and protection of the Lord all these years, many Jews today still do not accept Jesus as their personal Lord and Saviour.

As we examine the history of Israel, may we examine ourselves. Have you accepted Jesus as your Saviour? If yes, let me ask you three important questions:

1. Has your life changed for the better?
2. When you sin, do you have this nagging feeling that gives you a lot of discomfort?
3. Do you desire to read God's Word?

I hope your answer to each question is "Yes". We will never be perfect until we reach heaven, but if we are Christians, our lives must be different from when we were not believers. Also, although we will continue to sin as Christians, there will be this uncomfortable feeling when we sin because we will grieve the Holy Spirit who dwells in us. Lastly, if you are a child of God, you will want to read the Word of God for it has the power to change those who read and meditate upon it.

Going to church and attending Junior Worship classes are good but they are not enough. We need to read and put into practice God's word – it helps us examine what we are, what we do, what we like, in the light of Scriptures. James 1:23-24 make it very clear, "For if any be a hearer of the word, and not a doer, he is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a glass: For he beholdeth himself, and goeth his way, and straightway forgetteth what manner of man he was."

Thought: May I examine myself through God's Word.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, may I examine myself through Your Holy Word and I pray I will not just be a hearer, but be a doer of Your word. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

GOD RESTORES MY SOUL!

“Don’t these old cars look funny, Grandpa?” asked Chris, when he and his grandfather visited a vintage car exhibition one day.

Grandpa smiled. “Well,” he said, “they look a bit funny to us now, but they were pretty fancy in their day, you know.” He pointed to one of the cars. “That is like the one my grandfather drove when I was about your age. GOD'S CREATION IN SIX DAYS!

Here is another great truth – this world was created in six days! Modern geologists who study the layers of the earth to determine their age tell us that this is not possible; but we know that “With men it is impossible, but not with God: for with God all things are possible” (Mark 10:27).

Geologists work on the wrong assumption that the many layers of the earth were formed through regular and steady build-up through millions of years. They do not take into account that there was a period when the global flood in the days of Noah caused great movements of the earth's layers. Prayer: Heavenly Father, thank You for the reminder that Your timing is always the best. May I learn to depend more and more on You, and to commit any problems and cares to You, my Creator and King. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

It was God who called to them. God's first aim was to convince them of their wickedness. He did it tenderly, preferring that they confess on their own accord, rather than be forced to acknowledge their sin. Adam, however, put the blame on Eve who had given the forbidden fruit to him. It is sad that the human heart was already "deceitful above all things and desperately wicked", because Eve also was quick to blame the serpent. So, the guilty pair did not at once come humbly to God to confess their sin.

But there is always mercy and forgiveness with the Lord. Genesis 3:15 foretells that the Saviour, born of the woman's seed, would crush Satan who had deceived them.

THE GOSPEL FIRST GIVEN

The first gospel given is also the first promise recorded in the Scriptures. It brought hope when our first parents were in despair after they sinned. It was contained in this sentence: "I will put enmity between thee (Satan) and the woman, and between thy seed (mankind, evil by nature) and her seed (Jesus)."

This promise is also a revelation of God's mercy to the world. It speaks of a coming Saviour who would be born of a virgin. Note that God did not say "their seed" – meaning the seed of both Adam and Eve. Instead, He said "her seed", meaning that the seed is only of the woman. This promised seed of the woman would bruise the serpent's head.

God, in His love and wisdom, sent the Saviour to conquer Satan and thus save mankind. Satan thought he was victorious when he beguiled our first parents. But this 'triumph' was short-lived, for Christ would "bruise his head". Being the seed of the woman, our Lord Jesus Christ is mighty to save and has everlasting victory.

THE FIRST OFFERING

In the history of our first parents, the first birth must have been an event of great joy. Cain, the first-born, was after all the first baby in the world! When both children were born, the parents must have felt much tenderness, responsibility and joy. Eve showed her faith when she said, after bearing Cain, "I have gotten a man from the LORD!"

Adam and Eve were acquainted with God, and must have nurtured and trained the two boys in the ways of the Lord. God had also graciously made them acquainted with the way of salvation by His Son, the only way of worshipping Him acceptably, and godly fear. They must have also taught them that the Almighty God would only accept sin offerings of animals.

However, in disobedience, Cain brought of the fruit of the ground as offerings to the Lord. His brother, Abel, on the other hand, brought of the firstlings of his flock, and the Lord was pleased with Abel's offerings. But Cain and his offering, God did not accept. God cannot accept a bloodless sacrifice, but unbelieving Cain did not obey God's divine instruction. Cain did not have a believing heart.

THE FIRST MURDER

Cain was downcast when God did not accept his sacrifice. God was pleased with Abel's offerings, but with Cain's sacrifice, God's disapproval was seen in its cold neglect.

Cain was greatly upset and jealous over God's preference to his brother's offering. Despite the Lord's words to him that, if he repented, he would also be accepted (verse 7), Cain chose to be filled with hatred for his brother. As we shall see, this hatred developed into the worst kind – murder.

While the brothers were in the field, Cain rose up and murdered his brother Abel. The first-born of the human race showed that he was so wicked and hardened. His brother Abel, whom he had once played with and loved, lay on the ground. Cain stood alone in the field. God's eyes were upon him. Cain had done his evil work, and the voice of his brother's blood cried to Heaven from the ground.

Although the Lord showed him the way to repentance, he chose to reject it. Such is the way of the world today. Many may know about Jesus, and many may have heard of the salvation story, but few want to take up the cross and follow Jesus.

Sin, if not properly dealt with, will cause us to stray further from God and to sin even more. Is there some unconfessed sin in your life? Are you harbouring some wrong thoughts? Have you done some wrong action, or had some wrong ideas? Turn them all to Jesus, and He can wash you and cleanse you.

Is it not sad that the first child of the world turned out to be a murderer? Is it not sad that the first siblings in the world turned out to be enemies? Is it not sad that the effect of sin has stained mankind?

Thought: May I not be stained with sin.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, help me deal with sin in my life. When I sin, help me confess and seek Your forgiveness. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

THE FIRST MAN WHO DID NOT DIE!

Genesis chapter 5 is a record of the family tree of Adam. Notice that all the patriarchs before the flood lived to a ripe old age; this is not possible today. Why so? Because the wonderful environment God gave then was conducive to longevity. Before the global flood, the world had never experienced rain. There was enough moisture in the atmosphere for plants and trees. That is why it was so difficult for so many in the time of Noah to believe there would be a global flood. It was because there had never been any rain at all.

Enoch was 65 years when he begat Methuselah. Imagine – a new father when a man is 65! How old was your father when he became a dad for the first time? Likely in his 20s or 30s. But in those days, people lived much longer and perhaps a man about 65 years old is like a young man today!

Then it was recorded that Enoch walked with God after he begat Methuselah. The phrase “To walk with God” means to have close communion with Him and to be under His watchful eye. It is to make God’s Word our guide in life, and His glory our goal in all our actions. Enoch continued to walk faithfully with God for three hundred years, and suddenly we read that God took him! He was gloriously removed to a better world. He was translated that he should not see death, and was not found. His excellent piety was crowned with exceeding great and precious honours.

Do you “walk with God” like Enoch? Do you talk to Him everyday? Do you love to read His Word and put into practice what Scriptures teach?

Thought: May I walk closely with God every day.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, may I joyously walk with Thee and talk with Thee day by day. Teach me to enjoy close fellowship with Thee. In Jesus’ name I pray, Amen.

THE DISOBEDIENCE OF MAN

As we trace the family tree of Adam down the centuries to Noah, we notice that there was a degeneration of mankind as it grew more and more sinful. The fallen angels (“sons of God”) possessed man, and intermarried with daughters of men. They in turn gave birth to mighty men who brought about the violence and great wickedness in the world.

After giving ample warning, God, as a just judge, will mete out punishment on the unrepentant. In the days of Noah, God warned the people (through Noah) about the coming judgment. But, the people chose to turn a deaf ear; after many years of warning, God finally sent the flood.

GLOBAL DESTRUCTION OF THE EARTH

The world's worst flood in modern times took place in 1931 when China's Yellow River burst its banks and overflowed into its surrounding areas, killing up to 3 million people. The areas near the river are prone to floods because of 2 main factors: the expanse of flat ground that lies around it and the melting of the ice dams in the north of the river which causes a gush of water into the river. However, that flood cannot be compared with the global flood in the days of Noah, recorded for us in today's text. Not only were the humans and animals living in a certain area affected, God said, "every living substance that I have made will I destroy from off the face of the earth".

Verse 19 also tells us "all the high hills, that were under the whole heaven, were covered". This clearly tells us that the flood waters were so high that it reached the top of every hill in the whole world then. Everything was covered with water. No creature could escape; no place was dry. There was water everywhere. Because of the wickedness of the people of the world at that time, all living creatures died, except the eight humans in the Ark, and all the animals brought in by them.

God commanded Noah to build the ark. God gave Noah the specifications of the ark - its length, its breadth, its height and even the type of wood to be used to build the ark. Noah did all that the Lord commanded. Noah had faith in the Lord. In the end, only Noah, his wife, his sons and their wives went into the ark, and were saved from the flood. The Lord preserved Noah and his family, but all others perished. People today are a little like the people then. No one living today has seen Jesus in the flesh, and so, they do not believe in Him. But God said "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." (Heb 11:1) So, this is faith: to believe even though we do not see. We simply believe in God, just as a young child believes in his parents without questioning.

Dear child, do you believe God, or the world?

Thought: May I always believe God and His word.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, help me learn lessons of faith from the global flood that covered the face of the earth in Noah's time. May I always put my faith in You completely. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

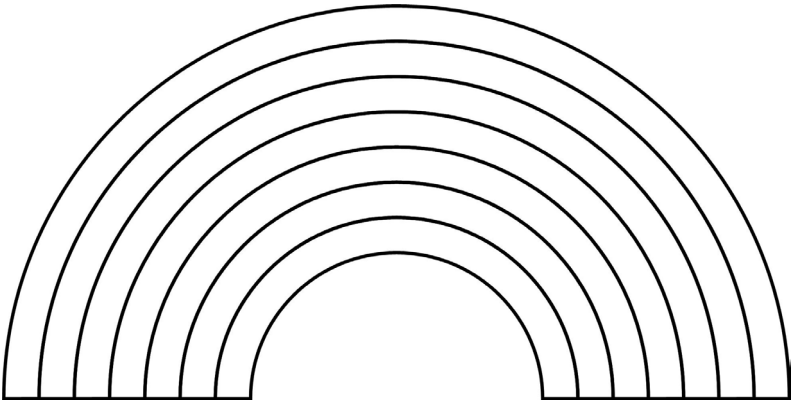
THE FIRST RAINBOW

When the flood finally subsided, Noah and his family were allowed out of the Ark. God made a covenant or agreement with Noah and his family, and with generations of mankind thereafter, that there will never be another global flood again.

God sealed the promise with the beautiful token of a rainbow in the sky. This is the “bow in the cloud” mentioned in verse 13. Previously, the earth never had any rainbow, as there was no rain. Rainbows are caused by the rays of the sun reflected from the falling raindrops at a particular angle to the eye of the spectator. The next time you catch a rainbow, recall the promise of God to mankind. Thank and praise Him too for His mercy not to destroy the earth by a flood again.

THE TOWER OF BABEL – PRIDE AND REBELLION

The Bible tells us that the human race decided to make a permanent dwelling on a fertile land they found. Using bricks and slime, they wanted to build a city and a tower “whose top may reach unto heaven”. They also wanted to make a name for themselves, and this impressive tower was to be called the “Tower of Babel”.

This was not just a tall tower. There was pride and rebellion against God. This building they set out to create was probably a ziggurat, a multi-storied tower which they wanted to build to reach heaven. God wanted the people to populate and fill the earth, but they went against God’s desire. Instead, they wanted to build the tower, so that they would not be scattered. This did not please God at all.

The meaning of the word “Babel” means “confusion”, and it was clear that the Lord wanted to do just that. God confounded the people’s language, so that they could not understand each other, and after that, He scattered them all over the world.

The main sins then were pride and rebellion.

Thought: May I never be guilty of pride and rebellion.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, please teach me humility from today’s RPG reading. May I remember I am but a creature of Yours, and so must give You all glory and honour. In Jesus’ name I pray, Amen.

GOD'S COVENANT WITH ABRAHAM

God called Abram from out of the country called Ur of the Chaldees, an idol-worshipping country. The Lord wanted Abram to get out of his country, away from his relatives and his father's house. The Lord did not tell him exactly where to go, but assured him that He will guide him to "a land that I will shew thee". The amazing thing is that Abram, whose name God later changed to Abraham, obeyed and left, and did exactly what the Lord told him to do.

But God knew how difficult it was for Abraham. He also made a promise or a covenant with Abraham. It was to be an everlasting covenant, as God would keep His Word forever. It would stand for thousands of years, as long as man exists on earth. This promise had two parts: the first was that Abraham would be the father of a great nation— the Jewish people; the second was that Jesus Christ would come from the Jewish people to save the world from sin.

By believing in Jesus, sinners would be saved. They would become blessed through this covenant God gave to Abraham. The greatest blessing through God's covenant with Abraham, is the gift of eternal life through Jesus.

When you see the word "LORD" in capital letters in the Bible, do you know what it means? The word "LORD" means Jehovah, the covenantal God. So every time you come across that word, remember the covenant God gave to Abraham, and through it, the covenant God gives to you in Jesus.

Thought: God's covenant extends to me.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, thank You for blessing me through Abraham's covenant. I pray that I will not take this covenant for granted, and learn to live my life to please You. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

BEING A GOOD TESTIMONY FOR THE LORD

In a wealthy country like Singapore, there is no lack of food and water. However, the situation is very different elsewhere. It is estimated that 800,000,000 people in this world go hungry or thirsty daily. Where do these people live? Most of them live in parts of Asia and Africa, where famines sometimes occur. Famines are the result of drought. The land becomes parched because of the lack of rain. Crops cannot grow and animals die. People then die from lack of food and water.

Genesis chapter 41 tells us about a severe famine in Egypt during the time of Joseph. Before the famine, Pharaoh who ruled Egypt, had two dreams. In his first dream, he saw seven fat cows and seven thin cows. The seven thin cows then ate up the seven fat cows. Pharaoh woke up and then fell asleep again. He had a second dream. He dreamt about seven thin ears of corn which devoured seven full ears of corn. Pharaoh called upon his magicians and wise men, but none could interpret his dreams. The chief butler who had remembered how Joseph interpreted his dream told Pharaoh. Pharaoh then had Joseph released from prison, and asked him to interpret his dreams. Joseph said to Pharaoh what the Lord had revealed to him. Joseph interpreted the dreams to mean that there will be seven good years of harvest in Egypt followed by seven years of famine. Joseph then advised Pharaoh to find a wise man to oversee the gathering and storage of grain during the seven good years of harvest, so that the food stored will be used during the seven years of famine. What Joseph said was good in the eyes of Pharaoh and his servants. Joseph found favour with men. Pharaoh, seeing how the Lord was with Joseph, appointed him to rule over Egypt, second in command only to him.

The Bible records for us that the Lord was with Joseph (Genesis 39:2; 21). The Lord blessed Joseph in whatever he did. Joseph was a good testimony to the people around him. Joseph had obeyed the Lord and kept close to Him.

Thought: Have you been obedient to the Lord? Have you been a good testimony for the Lord?

Prayer: Heavenly Father, help me be obedient to Thy Word. Help me live a life pleasing before You, so that I can be a good testimony to others. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

THE SIN OF SODOM AND GOMORRAH

In certain American states, a man is allowed to marry a man, and a woman is allowed to marry a woman. This is a very TERRIBLE sin. It is because of this sin of homosexuality and lesbianism that Sodom and Gomorrah were destroyed by fire and brimstone.

The world today is increasingly leaning towards the god of the world – Satan. Through Satan’s lies, many believe that homosexuality is acceptable. Fifty years ago, this would have been unthinkable. But today, what God calls an abomination is celebrated as “an alternative lifestyle”, an individual choice for others. Why are so few people speaking out against homosexuality? Today, even churches agree to homosexuality. Worse than that – there are some so-called pastors who are homosexuals!

Homosexuality is a grievous sin in the eyes of God. The Bible also tells us in 1 Corinthians 6:9-10 “Know ye not that the unrighteous shall not inherit the kingdom of God? Be not deceived: neither fornicators, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor effeminate, nor abusers of themselves with mankind, Nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners, shall inherit the kingdom of God.” The “kingdom of God” means Heaven. “Abusers of themselves with mankind” describe homosexuals. Thus, homosexuals, if they continue in their sins and do not repent, will not enter Heaven. Instead, if they die in their sins without accepting the Lord Jesus, they will end up in Hell and the Lake of Fire.

Thought: The world today is growing more wicked, and becoming more accepting to homosexuality.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, help me recognise that homosexuality is a grievous sin. Help me live a pure and holy life which is pleasing before you. In Jesus’ name I pray, Amen.

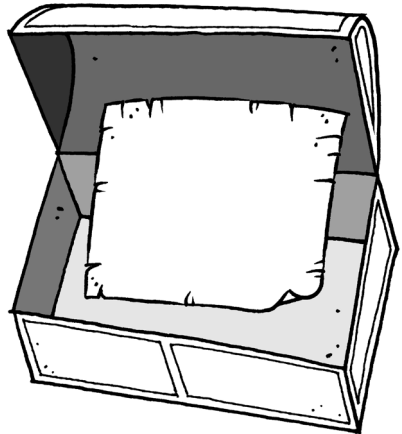
THE NAME ISAAC, AND YOUR NAME

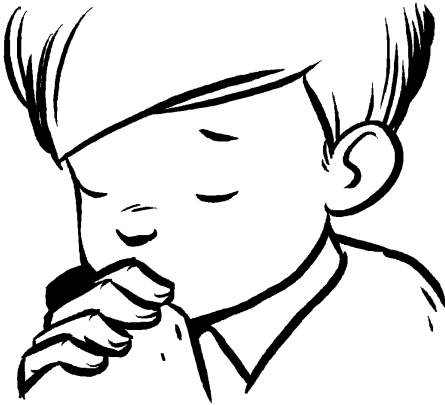
CHRISTMAS!

Was God unreasonable? Did God really want Abraham to sacrifice Isaac? No. What God wanted to do was to test Abraham and through the testing, for Abraham to better understand his own faith.

The marvellous thing about this passage is the faith of Abraham.

Although he was severely tested, his faith in God was never shaken. He never complained when God told him that he needed to sacrifice his precious son. On the journey to the hill where he was to kill Isaac, Abraham did not show any sign of fear. In fact, when Isaac asked Abraham what offering they were to give God, Abraham was full of confidence in God, because he told his son that God would provide an offering Himself.

Has there been any case of a dead person coming back to life during or before the time of Abraham? No. But somehow, Abraham had the faith to believe. Such a faith is amazing. Faith can protect us from doubt; faith can shield us from straying from God.

Dear child, may you have the shield of faith mentioned in Ephesians 6:16 – "Above all, taking the shield of faith, wherewith ye shall be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked."



Thought: May my shield of faith be used well!

Prayer: Heavenly Father, grant me the simple faith that continues to trust in You and Your precious Word. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

DECEPTION BY REBEKAH AND JACOB

Isaac and Rebekah had twin boys – Esau, and his younger brother Jacob. Though they were twins, their personalities and looks were very different. Esau was a hairy man who was also a skilled hunter. Jacob, on the other hand, had smooth skin, and was not an outdoor person, preferring to live in his tent. There was also a major problem in the family – the parents practised favouritism. Isaac loved Esau the first-born, but Rebekah loved Jacob the second child.

JACOB AND ESAU RECONCILED

In Genesis chapter 27, Jacob had cheated Esau of the blessings of his birthright by pretending to be the older first-born son when he was the younger son. As a result, Esau became very angry at Jacob, and threatened to kill Jacob. Jacob then fled from Esau, and went to the land of Padan-aram. Many years later, Jacob decided to return to the land of Canaan, but he was in fear of his brother Esau whom he had cheated of his birthright. Fearing Esau's wrath, he sent his wives and families to cross the river Jabbok. He also prepared and sent presents to Esau ahead of him to appease his brother.

Esau who then lived in the country of Edom, south of Canaan, then went up to the river Jabbok to meet up with his brother Jacob. Jacob must have been very afraid that his brother Esau would harm him. But to Jacob's surprise, Esau ran to meet him and embraced him, and both of them wept. Esau had forgiven Jacob for what he had done. The two brothers were reconciled.

To "reconcile" means to forgive one another, to make peace with each other, and to restore the relationship with each other.

Dear children, have you been in a situation where someone did wrong to you and made you angry, so much so that you did not want to befriend that person anymore? Were you ever in a quarrel with a friend, and did not speak to each other after the quarrel? The Bible tells us that we need to forgive one another (Colossians 3:13). Through forgiving one another, we can be reconciled to each other. God wants us to love and care for each other.

Thought: May I learn to forgive others even though they sin against me.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, may You give me a forgiving attitude towards others when they sin against me, and may I seek to reconcile with them. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

BEWARE OF JEALOUSY

Today's passage tells us that Joseph's brothers were jealous of him. Why? Their father loved Joseph more than any other child. He also gave Joseph a beautiful multi-coloured coat. Every time his brothers saw it, they were unhappy, because they were not given such coats.

Do you ever feel jealous? Maybe you think your parents favour your sibling but not you? Perhaps you think they spend more time with another child, and you feel a little neglected? Or perhaps you think a present given to you is not as precious as something given to your sister or brother? One may be jealous not only of family members but also of friends or even strangers. Some children like to compare the gadgets they have, the places they go to for vacations, or the marks they get in school.

Dear child, beware of jealousy. The brothers of Joseph were jealous, and that led them to do something terrible to their own brother – they sold him as a slave to strangers, not caring if he lived or died and hoping never to see him again. Jealousy is like a virus that cannot be seen but is very harmful. We have the most wonderful privilege of being a child of God, and that must comfort us and give us more than enough joy.

When we see others do better than we in school, we should be happy for them instead of being jealous. God has a wonderful plan for all of us, and we must be content with what He has planned. As students, try your best and study hard, and leave the rest to the Lord.

Do you still harbour jealousy in your heart? If you do, please pray that God will take that feeling away from you before it hurts you more. You must remember that jealousy is a sin, and that you need God's cleansing and help to get rid of it.

Thought: May I avoid the "virus" of jealousy.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, I pray that I will not be jealous when I see good things happen to others. Instead, I will be happy for them. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

GOD'S WONDERFUL PLAN

After Joseph was sold as a slave, his future was bleak. After all, what can a slave look forward to but daily toil and labour? But this was no ordinary slave. This was a child of the Almighty Lord, and God had a wonderful plan for him. No one could have imagined that Joseph the slave could later become the Egyptian Pharaoh's trusted and most senior official. His life story is a wonderful example of God's mercy and grace. After being sold as a slave in Egypt by his jealous brothers, he worked in the house of Potiphar, an officer of Pharaoh's. Wrongly accused by Potiphar's wife for molesting her, he ended up in prison.

But God was at work in Joseph's life, and God gave him the gift of being able to interpret dreams. He interpreted the dream of the butler correctly, which was that the man would be restored to his butlership again. When Pharaoh had a dream, the butler remembered Joseph who could interpret dreams. So Joseph was called before Pharaoh, and, by the power of God, was able to successfully interpret Pharaoh's dream. On top of that, Joseph advised him on how to save during the seven years of plenty, because they would be followed by seven years of famine. Pharaoh was so pleased that he appointed Joseph, whom he described as "discreet and wise" to oversee the work, being second only to himself.

FORGIVENESS

We end this year's Junior RPG reading with a most beautiful passage about forgiveness. We continue with the account of Joseph.

He was a powerful official in Egypt when a famine affected the land of Egypt and surrounding countries. People from these countries had to seek Egypt's help to sell them food, and among these people who came were his brothers!

You will recall these were the men who betrayed Joseph and sold him into slavery years ago. When they saw Joseph, they could not recognise him. They did not expect him to be alive. They would have never imagined that their long-lost brother would be the powerful official standing in front of them.

Do you think the 10 brothers were afraid when Joseph revealed who he was? Of course! They must have been so fearful because the brother they harmed is now such a powerful man. But Joseph was indeed wise and godly, and told them it was God's wonderful plan to have sent him to Egypt through his brothers. Instead of anger, Joseph had forgiveness and love.

Have you been hurt by someone? Do you have any anger in your heart against anyone? Do you think it is very difficult to forgive someone for the pain he has caused you? If so, learn from Joseph. If he could forgive the evil done by his brothers, we can forgive the pain others cause us. Remember it is not that Joseph was great; it is his God that is great.

The God of Joseph is also your God. If He can help Joseph forgive, He can help you too, if you are willing.

As we come to the close of the year, search your hearts to see if there is any unforgiving spirit or bitterness in you. If there is, please pray to the Lord to help you forgive and not be bitter about things.

Thought: He who is unforgiving and bitter hurts himself most.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, may I learn to be as forgiving as Joseph was, and also understand that nothing happens by chance, but by Your will. I thank You for keeping me this year, and ask that You would continue to be merciful to me in the new year. Heavenly Father, I need Your help and guidance everyday, so I pray that I will continue to keep close to You. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

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
